

What do I do if I find a Munition or Suspicious Item?

Follow the 3Rs:



Recognize:

Recognizing when you may have encountered a munition is key to reducing the risk of injury or death. If you encounter or suspect you may have encountered a munition, consider it extremely dangerous. Remember, munitions are sometimes hard to identify. Use caution and leave any suspicious item alone and do not touch it.

Retreat:

If you encounter or suspect that you have encountered a munition or suspicious item, immediately and carefully – do not run – leave the area following the same path on which you entered. If you can, mark the general area using a piece of cloth tied to a tree, a hat on the ground, or using your phone to identify the GPS coordinates for the general area.

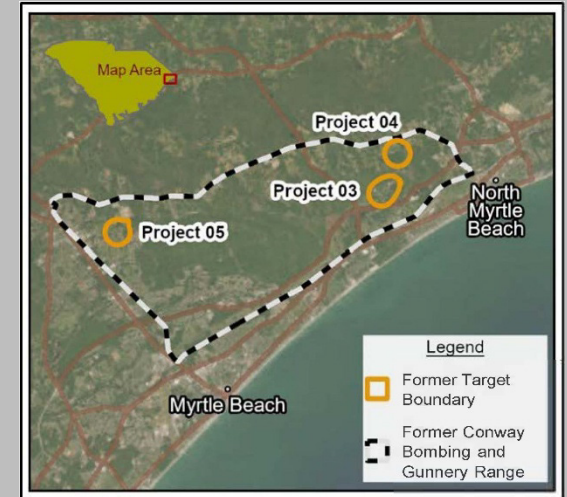

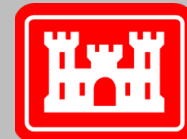

Munitions Safety Information You Should Know



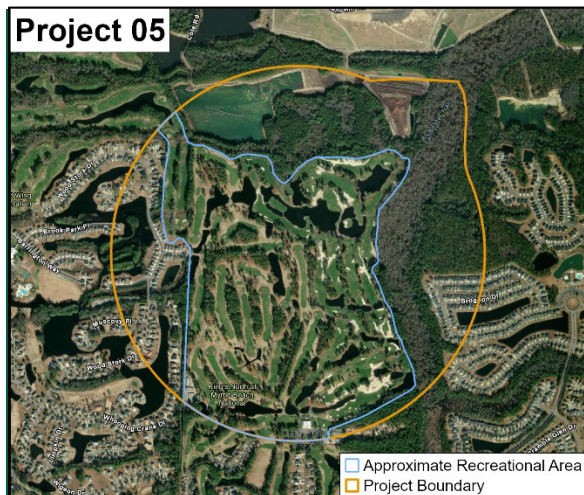

Background

The Conway Bombing and Gunnery Range (CBGR) Formerly Used Defense Sites (FUDS) property consists of approximately 55,854 acres and is located nine miles southeast of Conway and seven miles north of Myrtle Beach in Horry County, South Carolina. The northern and eastern boundary of the property is along State Highway 90, the southern boundary is the intracoastal waterway, and the western boundary of the property follows Interstate 501. From 1942 to 1947, the FUDS property served to support flight, air-to-ground gunnery, and bombing training.

This pamphlet is specific to Project 05 - FUDS Project Number: I04SC002505 within the FUDS property.

Project 05, approximately 686 acres in the northwest section of the CBGR FUDS property, includes residential, commercial, recreational areas, and wetlands. Investigations in 2012 and 2018 found remnants of expended 100-lb practice bombs and identified additional munitions debris, indicating the potential presence of munitions.



Munitions Concerns

Based on investigations and the discovery of munitions debris, there is a potential for munitions to be present within the Project boundary.

What are munitions?

Munitions and explosives of concern is a term that refers to military munitions that did not explode when they were deployed and still pose a potential risk of detonation many decades after they were used or discarded. Munitions include unexploded ordnance (UXO) and discarded military munitions (DMM). *Munitions debris* are inert remnants of munitions, which don't have an explosive component.

Given the Age of These Munitions, Are They Still Dangerous?

Yes. Munitions are designed to inflict injury and cause damage. Due to age and exposure to the elements, munitions tend to become more unstable, sensitive, and dangerous.

What Do Munitions Look Like?

Munitions come in many different shapes and sizes. They can look like or be shaped like a:

- Pointed Pipe
- Soda Can
- Round Ball
- Muffler
- or Man-Made Debris

They may:

- Be visible on the ground surface or be buried
- Be exposed by erosion, fire, or excavation
- Look new or old and rusted
- Be complete, crushed, or in parts

What do they look like?

Note: Actual munitions items found may not look exactly like the photos.

A black powder spotting charge is designed to produce a small flame with smoke to assist spotters in identifying the location of impact, which could cause a potential risk if handling the item.
