# MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322 (2023) ,<sup>1</sup> SAS-2018-00965 (MFR1 of 1)<sup>2</sup>

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.<sup>3</sup> AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.<sup>4</sup> For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),<sup>5</sup> the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 Rapanos-Carabell guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the Sackett decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating iurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of "waters of the United States" found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court's decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States," as


Name of excluded feature	Size (in acres)	Type of resource generally not jurisdictional	
Wetland 2	0.94	Wetland 2 lacks a continuous surface connection (CSC) to water of the US. This wetland is abutting Wetland 3; however, these two wetlands are surrounded by uplands on all sides. During a site visit on May 3, 2024, the Corps walked the western perimeter of this wetland. This area consisted of a powerline easement and had a low elevation relative to Wetland 2. There were no signs of a wetland, CSC, or water flow within this area.	
Wetland 3	4.88	Wetland 3 lacks a continuous surface connection (CSC) to water of the US. This wetland is abutting Wetland 2; however, these two wetlands are surrounded by uplands on all sides. During a site visit on May 3, 2024, the Corps walked the western perimeter of this wetland. This area consisted of a powerline easement and had a low elevation relative to Wetland 2. There were no signs of a wetland, CSC, or water flow within this area.	
Wetland 4	0.03	Wetland 4 lacks a continuous surface connection to water of the US. This is a small, depressional wetland that is surrounded by uplands on all sides. The western boundary of the wetland consisted of a dirt road. During a site visit on May 3, 2024, the Corps determined that there were no signs of flow or subsurface connectively between Wetland 4 and the western side of the road.	
Wetland 5	0.48	Wetland 5 lacks a continuous surface connection to water of the US. This is a circular, depressional wetland that is surrounded by uplands on all sides.	
Wetland 6	0.74	Wetland 6 lacks a continuous surface connection to water of the US. This wetland is surrounded by uplands on all sides. The western boundary of this wetland consisted of a dirt road. During a site visit on May 3, 2024, the Corps located a pipe (approximately 8 in in diameter) going under the road to the west. There were no signs of flow on either side of the pipe. Additionally, the pipe outfall to the west of the road did not consist of wetland or have a continuous surface connection to waters of the US. Ultimately, if water moved through the pipe, it would outfall into uplands.	
Wetland 7	2.70	Wetland 7 lacks a continuous surface connection to water of the US. This wetland is surrounded by uplands on all sides. During a site visit on May 3, 2024, no connection could be located between this wetland and the pond and ditch system to the east of the project boundary. Although NHD and NWI indicated that this wetland may be connected to the pond, there were clear uplands (including a gravel driveway) between the two aquatic features. There were no signs of water flow, either on the surface or subsurface, between Wetland 7 and the pond	

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wetland that was isolated from any nearby features.	to the east. Ultimately, this wetland consisted of a depressional
	wetland that was isolated from any nearby features.
